9 programs of TWC recognized with STAR awards

A National TVET Forum themed "Driving Quality Assurance in TVET in the 4th Industrial Revolution (4IR) was organized by the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) that aims to upscale the quality of technical-vocational education and training (TVET) programs for the development of a more competitive Filipino workforce.

During the forum, the participants also witnessed the TESDA System for TVET Accreditation and Recognition (STAR) awards to 131 programs of 53 Technical Vocational Institutions (TVIs). The STAR rating system recognizes the accomplishments, innovations and improvements that the TVIs have instituted beyond the minimum requirements set in the Unified TVET Program Registration and Accreditation System (UTPRAS) set by

TESDA. The system utilizes four major objective and evidence-based criteria, namely: Governance and Management, Curriculum Development, Support Services, and Program Performance Measures with corresponding stars.

The TESDA Women's Center (TWC) was one of the 53 TESDA TVIs that garnered 1 Star Level Ratings in Barista NC II, Dressmaking NC II, EPAS NC II, FBS NC II, Food Process-

On June 6, 2019, a Stakeholders' Forum for the Automotive and Land Transport sector was held at the Holiday Inn and Suites Hotel in Makati City. It was organized by the TESDA Women's Center through the initiative of the Center Advisory Council

(CAC). The forum created a platform to gather relevant inputs from the industry players and other participants of the round table discussion regarding women's participation in the Automotive and Land Transport Sector and the skills requirements relevant to

their company needs; identify opportunities where women take on specific jobs or job groups within the industry value chain; and identify opportunities for partnerships with the TWC in specific areas.

In a welcome message, the TESDA District Director Ma. Angelina M. Carreon of Pasay-Makati representing the TESDA-NCR Regional Director, Conrado G. Bares emphasized that the forum has bring together key industry players in the sector and their presence is an active testimony to the engagement of the sector in promoting the entry of more skilled women to the sector.

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TWC holds Cook-Off Challenge

A total of 7 teams from the current batch of Cookery NC II trainees enrolled at the TESDA Women Center (TWC) competed in the first TWC Cook-Off Challenge held on May 27, 2019 at the Tandang Sora Hall in collaboration with Mama Sita Foundation.

While TESDA trainees are familiar with skills competition, this one is rather unique as it concentrated on the traditional Filipino Cuisine using local ingredients. Each team was given a free hand in the choice of a hot meal and entries included chicken caldereta, chicken adobo with gata, seafood bicolexpress, ginataang tilapia, smoked flavored humba, pork binagoongan, and everlasting (embutido).

"We are happy to be given this rare privilege to partner with Mama Sita Foundation. This competition goes out of the standard cooking that we do at the center and will develop the skills needed in the 21st Century as the trainees will be able to do problem-solving and show their creativity in presenting traditional Filipino Cuisine," Maria Clara Ignacio, TWC Chief said in her message.

The criteria for judging were cleanliness, grooming and orderly preparation (15%), production (20%), presentation (25%), and taste/sensory evaluation (40%). The team that prepared the ginataang tilapia placed third, seafood bicol express team placed second, and the team that presented the smoked flavored humba was declared as the grand winner. Aside from Mama Sita goodies, they also received cash prizes - P10,000, P7,500, and P5,000 for the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place, respectively. Other teams received Mama Sita goodies and certificates of participation.

tion process within the Automotive Industry. She also gave her strong support to their efforts at making the workplaces women-friendly. TESDA Women's Center takes part in DepEd's Brigada Eskwela '19

The Department of Education (DepEd) recently conducted the 2019 Brigada Eskwela last May 20-25, 2019, or the National Schools Maintenance Week which is a five (5) day activity that aims to unite all education stakeholders to participate and put in their time, effort, skills, and resources to prepare and maintain the cleanliness and orderliness of public schools in preparation for the upcoming opening of the school year in June. The theme for this activity is "Matatag na Bayan para sa Maunlad na Paaralan."

Related to this, the TESDA Women's Center partnered with public schools in participation for the Brigada Eskwela Activity as part of the extension services that the institution provides. It is also a platform for the participating trainees of TWC to use their knowledge and skills in providing their service to the selected schools.

This year TWC has partnered with two public schools namely Pasay East High School and Upper Bicutan Elementary School.

Pasay City East High School (PCEHS) is located at E. Rodriguez Street, Barangay 158, Malibay, Pasay City. It is a public secondary school in Pasay City which was established in 1968. They offer Junior and Senior High-ready programs for the citizens of Malibay and its nearby districts. The school is part of the Division of City Schools in Pasay City and is recognized by DepEd.

On the other hand, the Upper Bicutan Elementary School is located at General Santos Ave., Lower Bicutan, Taguig City which caters mainly students from the area and other neighboring areas in Bicutan, Taguig City.

The TESDA Women's Center (TWC) trainees of Electronic Products Assembly and Servicing NC II (EPAS), Electrical Installation and Maintenance NC II (EIM) and Plumbing NC II provided extension services to the selected schools which were supervised by their trainers namely: Jennifer Caoile, Trainer, EPAS; Lawrence Hermias, Trainer, EIM; Jeffrey Sinangote & Maria Icely Villagracia, Trainers of Plumbing. Based on the observation in the ocular visit done by the trainers a week before the Brigada Eskwela, they saw the need for such services and the TWC has the expertise to provide the services needed by the two identified public schools.

A lot of repairs and replacements from the electrical wiring connections of the schools, electronics such as fans, lamps and fire alarms as well as water lines were found in the selected schools. These were based on the

findings of the trainers and were given appropriate actions and services by the TWC trainees with proper guidance from their respective trainers.

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The two-day involvement of the TWC in the Brigada Eskwela is a two-way success for the Training Center because it benefited the partner schools through the services rendered and allowed the trainees to utilize their skills and proficiency in their chosen trade area.

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The TWC also presented a Timeline Video consisting of pictures rooted from its establishment on April 28, 1998 until 2019. This is a way to look back at the activities and significant events the training center has been and to show how much it has achieved in 21 years. This is also a way to look forward for more momentous events, partnerships and opportunities.

TWC Trade Fair, another event intended specially for the trainers was held in the afternoon from 1:00 pm onwards at the TWC lobby. Participating bodies such as TWC Alumni Association, Bartending, and other individuals display their products from food, clothing, accessories, etc. The event was then flocked by trainees and other individuals who bought their desired products. All participants and guests of the anniversary were all delighted and look forward to another year of TWC from what she become today and what she will become in the coming years.
